Some terminology...

Transcript or Transcription

Text document or file created from the audio in a video

Captions Text overlaid on the screen, created from the audio in a video

Machine Transcription

Transcription created from software with no human intervention

Captioning Your Videos Maximizes Your Course Content for Everyone

- Students with documented accommodations.
- Students with undocumented needs, including hearing loss and processing disorders.
- Students for whom English is an acquired language.
- Students new to a discipline with a lot of field-specific jargon or key names.
- Students who are caregivers to small children (nap time!).
- Anyone who needs to complete course work in a quiet environment.

EDUCAUSE: Captioning Video is a "Rising Tide"

- 2015 study from the Oregon State University and 3PlayMedia found 98.6% of students surveyed (2800, US-nationwide) found captions helpful.
- 54% of students, regardless of self-disclosed disability status, use captions for video at least some of the time.
- "When asked why captions are helpful, respondents overall expressed strong agreement that captions help students focus, retain information, and overcome poor audio."





Figure 3. Reasons for using closed captions

This review article references over 100 studies that show the benefits for learners of using captioning.

The diagram to the right shows comprehension test scores for a variety of EAL students learning English (a) and for English-language students learning Russian (b).



"Similarly, faculty and administrators in higher education are unlikely to be aware of the benefits of captions for university students, despite the fact that captions perfectly illustrate the fundamental principle of Universal Design. Like curb cuts and elevators, captions were initially developed for persons with disabilities, and, like curb cuts and elevators, captions benefit persons with and without disabilities. Indeed, the overwhelmingly vast majority of persons who benefit from curb cuts and elevators are not persons with disabilities, and the same could be true for captions."

And what about transcripts?

- Often seen as a by-product of the captioning process, transcripts can be a great study tool.
 - Confirm accuracy of notes.
 - Check dates, spelling, etc.
- Transcripts can also be the basis of class exercises:
 - Group exercise: add three concepts/examples/case studies from the readings into the lecture transcript.
 - Find errors for bonus marks.



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







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Using the drawing tools in Kaltura Capture



Best Practices!

- Captions should be accurate, especially if you're going to expect students to know specific content or spell key terms correctly later!
- If speaker changes (eg. an interview), indicate who is speaking and when.
- Min. 22 point font, sans serif font, max. 32 characters / line (Kaltura's defaults all comply).
